My Year 4 Learning Journey Grid. Week Beginning 8.6.2020

MATHS

This week and next, we will focus on statistics. You will learn to interpret and present discrete and continuous data using appropriate graphical methods, including bar charts and time graphs. Solve comparison, sum and difference problems using information presented in bar charts, pictograms, tables and other graphs.

Looking at the different ways to represent data (bar graphs, pictograms, line graph, scatter graph, pie chart) answer some of these questions below WITH reasoning and explanations, and then drawing the representation of this data in the selected way.

1) Halifax City Football Club sold the following number of season tickets:

Male adults - 6,382

Female adults – 5,850

Boys -3,209

Girls - 5,057

Would you use a bar chart, table or pictogram to represent this data? Explain why and draw it.

2) Alex wants to use a pictogram to represent the favourite drinks of everyone in her class.



I will use this image to represent 5 children.

Explain why this is not a good idea and what would be a

more sensible choice, then present it.

3) Eva measured the temperature of a cup of tea every 30 minutes for 2 hours. Can you plot her results onto a line graph?
