Our learning:

Enjoy listening to longer stories and can remember much of what happens.

Can find it difficult to pay attention to more than one thing at a time.



Physical Development

Our learning:

Continue to develop their movement, balancing, riding (scooters, trikes and bikes) and ball skills.

Go up steps and stairs, or climb up apparatus, using alternate feet.



Personal, Social and Emotional

<u>Development</u>

Our learning:

Select and use activities and resources, with help when needed. This helps them to achieve a goal they have chosen, or one which is suggested to them.

Develop their sense of responsibility and membership of a community.



Literacy

Our learning:

Understand the five key concepts about print:

- print has meaning the names of the different parts of a book
- print can have different purposes
- page sequencing
- we read English text from left to right and from top to bottom.

Maths

Our learning:

Understanding the World

Our learning:

Use all their senses in hands-on exploration of natural materials.

Explore collections of materials with similar and/or different properties.

Talk about what they see, using a wide vocabulary.



Expressive Arts and Design

Our learning:

Take part in simple pretend play, using an object to represent something else even though they are not similar. Begin to develop complex stories using small world equipment like animal sets, dolls and dolls houses etc.

Make imaginative and complex 'small worlds' with blocks and construction kits, such as a city with different buildings



Activities for home:

Go for a walk around your neighbourhood. What can you see? Smell? Hear? Feel?

Reading stories about home and families or make your own story book about your family.

Work together on house hold chores, such as sorting the washing, baking and tidying up.
